KENYA AND UGANDA COMMUNITIES AND CIVIL SOCIETY STATEMENT ON THE COVID-19 TRIPS WAIVER

We, the undersigned, are communities of people living with and affected by HIV, TB and Non Communicable Diseases (NCDs) and Civil Society Organizations working in the area of health and human rights in Kenya and Uganda.

We take this opportunity to applaud the United States (US) for its decision to support a proposal for the <u>waiver of certain provisions of the TRIPS Agreement for the prevention, containment and treatment of COVID-19</u>. We are indeed grateful that the US has taken note of the fact that we are in a global crisis that requires extraordinary measures. The support of the TRIPS Waiver proposal is a strong show of commitment by the Biden-Harris administration to work with the global community in ensuring there is rapid access to affordable medical products including diagnostic kits, medical masks, other personal protective equipment and ventilators, as well as vaccines and medicines for the prevention and treatment of patients in dire need.

<u>During a regional meeting we held on 17th to 19th March 2021</u>, we urged both the Kenyan and Ugandan government to make use of flexibilities in the TRIPS agreement to ensure access to essential medicines. We also called upon all governments, in particular the G7 countries to support the Waiver Proposal.

We now urge the rest of the G7 and the European Union to support the Waiver Proposal to ensure equitable access to medical technologies through sharing of technologies, data, know-how, patents and other intellectual property rights across the world. It is time for solidarity of all WTO member states and for the members to hasten deliberations on this issue.

We also call upon pharmaceutical companies and research institutions to share their technology, know-how and intellectual property on COVID-19 vaccines and treatments through the World Health Organization's Covid-19 Technology Access Pool.

We call upon the Kenyan and Ugandan government to work in solidarity with other AU members and Africa CDC in engaging with pharmaceuticals to ensure local production.

We must step up the pace to make vaccines available to all.

The world needs a #PeoplesVaccine, not a profit vaccine. Thank you Biden-Harris.
